

Making Compound Words

Most compound words don't need hyphens. However, a small dash, called a hyphen, can be used between words that work together as a single idea to make a compound word.

For example:

up-to-date information
a time-consuming task



When to Use a Hyphen

Use a hyphen to join two or more words as a single adjective **before** a noun.

a **well-loved** toy

a **chocolate-covered** peanut



However, if the compound modifier comes after the noun, then no hyphen is used.

The **toy** is **well loved**.

The **peanuts** were **chocolate covered**.

When to Use a Hyphen

Use a hyphen with compound numbers.

sixty-four

a six-page document



Use a hyphen to avoid confusion or awkward combinations of letters.

re-sign the documents (not resign from a job)

shell-like (not shelllike, with three letter l's)
