#### Sweet Tastes


Your tongue is covered with thousands of tiny taste buds. The taste buds can recognise four basic kinds of tastes: sweet, salty, sour, and bitter.



## **Making Sugar Crystals**

What you need: sugar, clean glass jar, pencil, string, spoon

Tie the string to the pencil. Put the pencil across the top of the jar and make sure that the string does not touch the bottom of the jar.



Ask an adult to boil some water, then add sugar (a teaspoon at a time) to the water and stir. Keep adding sugar until the sugar stops dissolving.

Pour the solution into the glass jar, then place the pencil on the top of the jar with the string dangling into the sugar solution.

Put the jar somewhere it will not be disturbed. After 1-2 days, small crystals should start forming on the string.
