WRITING A DISCUSSION

Purpose:

To present information about different sides of an issue or topic.

Examples of Discussions:

newspaper editorials, letters to the editor, radio or television presentations and interview programs.



Structure:

- 1) Statement of Issue:
 - Statement of the issue and a preview of the main arguments.
- 2) Arguments:
 - Series of arguments and counter-arguments, with evidence for each point of view.
- 3) Recommendation:

A concluding statement that summarizes. This can include a personal recommendation.

Structural Features:

- * Use a title.
- * Organize arguments and counter-arguments by paragraphs.

Language Features:

- * Uses present tense. Examples: I am, we are.
- * Uses words that show cause and effect. Examples: therefore, as a result, consequently.
- * Uses conjunctions and connectives. Examples: because, furthermore, besides.
- * Uses ordinals to show order of importance of arguments. Examples: firstly, second, in the first place, finally.

Techniques:

- * Use formal and impersonal language to remain objective.
- * Provide the audience with an overview of different views on the topic.
- * Use evidence to elaborate on all arguments.
