

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## Choosing The Best Words for Intended Meaning

Choosing the right adjectives helps convey your intended meaning to your readers. Word choice also makes your writing more interesting and engaging!

Consider the adjectives big and small. They tell your reader a bit about the size of something. But these words are not effective at telling exactly how big or small something is.

Your words help the reader imagine the scene you are describing. Words are powerful! They can change what a reader 'sees' in their head!


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
## A Small Group Activity:
