Adverbial clauses of time tell us more about **when** the action in a sentence takes place.



You can start a sentence with an adverbial clause.

Remember to use a comma before writing the rest of the sentence.

On Saturday, my family went to the beach.

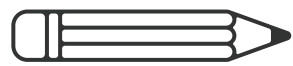

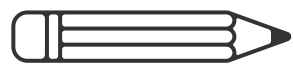
Adverbial clauses of time say when something happened.
